Fifith Sunday of Easter Year B

Real life

In today's Gospel – John 15:1-8 – we have a parable that is one of many expressions of the central theme of the Christian life. Jesus says: "Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me." It is our communion with Jesus that gives us life – real life. This is gift, It cannot be merited. The appropriate response is to let the gift flood through our beings like sap through the vine. If someone asks who are the Christians in our world, we can answer: "Those who abide in Jesus and Jesus abides in them." Nothing could be more simple really.

It will help us to begin to grasp the simplicity and transforming power of this truth if we recall some other expressions of the same truth in John's Gospel.

We have, for example, the Prologue of John's Gospel: "In the beginning was the Word ... and without him not one thing came into being... in him was life, and the life was the light of all people... The Word became flesh and lived among us" (1:1-4 & 14). The enfleshing of the Word is beautifully represented in the parable of the Good Shepherd: "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly" (10:10).

Sometimes the imagery used to communicate this truth is confronting, as when Jesus declares that "my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink. Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them" (6:55-56).

What a travesty of the Christian life it is when we reduce it to a moral project! Of course there is a profound moral vision in Jesus' life and teaching. But it does neither him nor us justice if we present Jesus primarily as a moral teacher. In order to find the moral vision, we must plumb the depths of the images of intimacy: He is "the Word made flesh", "the Good Shepherd", "the bread of life", "the light of the world". He is "the vine" and we are "the branches". Our real life is in him.
